A Loyal Member of the Germania Club For 50 Years Hans Bastel

Hans Bastel was born in 1938 in Hockenheim, Germany to Adolf and Katharina Bastel. His sister Beate was born three years later in Kassel. Because of Adolf's work during and after World War 2, the family moved around Germany quite often; Hockenheim, Magdeburg, Kassel, Hockenheim, Hennef (near Bonn) and then back to Hockenheim.

Hans started school in Kassel and subsequently attended school in Hockenheim, Schwetzingen and Bonn. This moving about did not result in great marks and so his father thought it might be better if Hans learned a trade. In 1953, he started his apprenticeship as an Industrial Mechanic (Maschinenschlosser) in Hennef and completed it in 1956. He then returned to Hockenheim to start his working career as a journeyman with "Vögele A.G." in Mannheim.

In 1955 Hans' parents and sister decided to immigrate to Canada, leaving Hans in Germany to finish his apprenticeship. In September 5-

1956 Hans, very reluctantly, followed his family to Canada; reluctantly because he liked life in Germany. Along with his education, he was very active in various sporting pursuits; track and field, swimming, gymnastics and his most favourite activity, team handball.

Once in Canada Hans found employment in his trade at various Hamilton companies (Westinghouse, Bowser, Dominion Glass and Harvester). He went to night school to learn English and to continue his high school education. ioined the St. Boniface Church and their Cäcilia Choir and of course once he was old enough - the Germania Club. During this time he met his future wife Erika Parzen. By 1960 Hans decided that shift work didn't really suit him, so he returned to school on a full-time basis in order to become a teacher. He was one of the first "mature" students in Hamilton to enter Grade 13. He had to convince the principal that a 22 year old student would not be a bad influence on the younger ones. Instead of attending teachers college following high school, Hans continued his education at McMaster University, obtaining his undergraduate degree in Mathematics and then added a Master of Science Degree in Applied Mathematics and Computer Science. His family thinks the Master's was just a way of delaying marriage, but in July of 1965 he and Erika tied the knot after 7 years of datina!

In 1967, after lecturing for one year at McMaster, he joined the staff of (cont'd on page 6)

the newly created Mohawk College as a Professor of Mathematics and thus entered the new world of computers and technology. He became the founding Chairman of the Computer Science and Information Technology Department. Over the years, Hans advanced his career to become the Dean of the Faculty of Engineering Technology. In this capacity he was responsible for all the College's apprenticeship, technician, technology, postgraduate and contract training programs in applied science and technology with an enrollment of over 7000 students. His job provided him with the opportunity to travel throughout Canada, as well as other countries such as Hungary, Ireland, Yemen, Saudi Arabia and Japan. After 33 years of service, Hans retired from Mohawk, but was asked back to help out with various projects. He is currently the Chair of the Mohawk College Retirees Association.

Since his retirement, Hans' main focus has been to support his family, sing in choirs and volunteer his services to a number of organizations. He lost both his parents within the past 5 years; Adolf in 2004 and Katharina just this past May, as well as his mother-in-law Margarete Parzen in 2005. He and Erika have spent time traveling; they enjoy going to Cuba every February and have just returned from a four week trip to Germany.

Hans and Erika have 3 children; Christine (a System Analyst at McMaster), Paul (the Marketing and Communications Manager at Phoenix Contact) and Andre (a Project Manager with Manulife in Waterloo), who are married, respectively to Alex, Angela and Lara. He is the very enthusiastic Opa to Ryan, Sofie, Daniel and Lauren. He likes playing handball with them, playing the "Zieharmonika" (button accordion) for them and happily helps Ryan and Sofie with their German and math homework. Daniel and Lauren are still a bit too young, but they soon will get their turn at Opa helping with homework, if they like it or not!

It was through team handball that Hans first learned of the Germania Club. On the ship to Canada he met a young lady whose brother played handball in Hamilton. The Germania Club had just formed a handball team which he then joined immediately.

Hans became a voting member of the Germania Club in 1956 at the then "legal" age of 21. He served as assistant treasurer for a number of years. This involved selling tickets for the Friday and Saturday night dances where he was paid \$5.00 per night. Fortunately he didn't have to work too many hours as in those days the dances sold out very early in the evening.

Over the years Hans has served the Club in many capacities; President for 2 years, Vice-President for 2 years, Secretary for 3 years, Chairman of Internal Auditors for 4 years, Player/Manager of the Handball Team for 9 years, Editor of the Germania Post for 3 years and of (cont'd on page 7)



One of his favourite activities has been to research the history of the Germania Club and its pre-war members, although sadly many of them have now passed on. For many years he was the one responsible for writing the biographies of th 50-year members for the past Stiftungsfests. Now it is his turn to be remembered as an extremely loyal and dedicated member of the Germania Club.
