THE GERMANIA CLUB OF HAMILTON A Brief History By Hans Bastel

On May 11th, 1915 the Hamilton Spectator published the following article: In view of this strong anti-German feeling throughout the city, intensified by the sinking of the Lusitania, the Officers of the Germania Club on Main Street East, at a meeting last night, decided to close the place up. This announcement was made by George Schnabel of the Spring Brewery Company, who is president of the Germania Club, to the Spectator reporter this morning.

Fortunately, the Club was allowed to close its doors "voluntarily", after all, both Hamilton's Mayor and the Chief of Police were Club members. It also meant that the Club retained its charter.

[In the above Spectator article, it refers to "the strong anti-German feeling throughout the city"]. It is no secret that the government-led, anti-German and anti-Kaiser propaganda was much more pronounced in Canada than it was in the USA, where no German clubs were closed. The reason for these strong propaganda campaigns was that relatively large segments of Canada's population, especially French and Irish Canadians, were opposed to going to war in support of Britain. Ireland, at the time, was still fighting for its independence from Britain and the French-Canadians had not forgotten how the British had expelled the French-speaking Acadians from Eastern Canada.

After the war, the Club had a hard time getting going again. Most minute books for that period were either not kept or have vanished. The anti-German war propaganda had understandably taken its toll and had discouraged and dispirited most Club members. But some of them, mostly led by the Ladies Auxiliary, did try!

There is evidence that in a building on 192 Main St East, near Ferguson, socials and dances were held. There is a mention of this in a Hamilton Spectator article of October 21st 1925. It reads as follows:

An innovation will be introduced into the Germania Club on Friday evening when, for a short time, the members will drop their cards and quit their dancing, to listen to the issues of the federal election discussions. Election candidates have been especially invited by the President, Mrs. J. Hitzroth.



[We know that Mrs. Hitzroth couldn't have been President of the Germania Club as women were not allowed to serve on the Board of Directors or to vote in the Club until much, much later, in 1979! She was, however, the President of the Club's Ladies Auxiliary.]

Things started to change in the late 1920s. Beginning in 1928, large numbers of German-speaking immigrants started arriving from Europe. Most of them came from regions which had been part of the Austro-Hungarian Empire prior to World War 1. These new arrivals wanted to join a club for German-speakers. They got in touch with the remaining directors of the "old" Germania Club. But these, by now, elderly gentleman were not interested in welcoming these "newbies" into their ranks and politely advised them to form their own club and try to prove that they were able to run a German social club in Hamilton. And this is exactly what happened!

In 1929, the "newbies" established a brand-new organization and named it "Verein Deutsches Heim, Hamilton", the Hamilton "German Home". They proceeded to rent a building on James Street North, close to the old City Hall. There they started a choir, a theater group, a German language school and organized ballroom dances. The theatre group must have been quite something, it performed entire operettas!

These successful activities impressed the directors of the "old" Germania Club to no end and, in 1935, they agreed to amalgamate the two organizations under the umbrella of the original 1884 Charter and the original name Germania Club of Hamilton Limited. The "old" Germania Club passed on a bank account containing exactly \$648.25!

This, of course, leads to an interesting question: What happened to the \$52,500 left over when the former clubhouse on 17 Main St East was sold, 18 years earlier? The answer is: The money went to the original shareholders, the "Aktieninhaber". [By the way, this cannot happen with today's Club - should it ever decide to disband. Back in 1970, the Club's charter was amended. Today's Club is no longer a corporation with share-capital, it is a corporation without share-capital. Any leftover funds would go to one or more charitable organizations. That is what it says in our current by-laws.]

But back in 1935, the newly amalgamated Club didn't have much time to fully develop because four years later, in 1939, World War II started, again with Germany being the enemy. Again, the Club was allowed to "voluntarily" stop all public events.

It should also be noted that the 1930s were very difficult times for everyone!



In North America, the Great Depression lasted from 1930 until 1939! Most breadwinners had lost their jobs in the manufacturing and construction industries. To survive economically, Club members did one of two things: They either started their own small businesses or they started farming in the Niagara Peninsula or in Norfolk County. Many Club members moved to the Delhi area where they either owned, or worked on, tobacco farms.

And guess what? These ex-Hamiltonians started the "Delhi German Home", the "Deutsches Heim Delhi" and more or less copied Hamilton's 1884 charter. The Delhi Club still exists today – you can check it out on the internet.

Back in Hamilton, other than once-a-year Board meetings, and the occasional trip to the German Club in Buffalo, Club-life was dormant during the war years. But this time around it didn't take long to get things rolling again after the war had ended in 1945.

Already in 1946, the Club started up with dances at the old Fischer's Hotel on York Street. These pre-World War II immigrants had things well in hand when the first German-speaking newcomers started arriving in large numbers after 1949.

When we started practising this cheerful Swedish spring greeting in preparation for our first spring concert which was to take place with Transylvania Kitchener as hosts - little did we know that the season and its outdoor delights would be restricted to our homes and backyards. And to this day, the beginning of summer, we really don't know how long this self-isolation will have to last. Like all choirs in the DKSB (Deutsch-Kanadischer Saenger Bund), we had several spring concerts lined up, and we were looking forward to meeting up with old friends and joining them with good food, good cheer, and, of course, lots of singing at the various venues.

At our last DKSB virtual meeting in May, we were told that choir practices are the most likely places for transmitting this horrid virus. In projecting our voices, we exhale strongly, thereby projecting with our breath pathogens, should we be carriers. Naturally, these can be inhaled by the people around us. As choristers, we are taught to make good use of our lungs in order to transmit a strong, clear sound.
